POTENTIAL VICTIMS OF **HUMAN TRAFFICKING**

A victim of trafficking is a person who:

- has been transported, recruited, and/or harboured [either] within a country and/or across transnational borders
- by the use or threat of: fear, fraud, force, deception, coercion, and/or abduction
- for the purposes of abuse, or the giving or receiving of payments and/or benefits,
- for the purpose of being exploited for labour, sexual exploitation or removal of organs.

When children and mentally impaired persons are trafficked, no violence, deception, or coercion needs to be involved: simply transporting, harbouring etc. them into those exploitative conditions constitutes trafficking.

You have been identified by the Garda Síochána (the Irish police) as a potential victim of human trafficking.

This leaflet has been produced by the Legal Aid Board to advise you of what this means, the process involved, and what we can do to assist you.

How was I identified as a potential victim of trafficking?

When you were referred to the Garda Síochána, the Garda National Immigration Bureau (GNIB) was informed. They considered if you were a "potential" victim of trafficking.

If they have not done so already, they will offer to refer you to support services, including:

- accommodation (provided by the Reception and Integration Agency),
- emotional support and material assistance,
- medical screening (provided by the HSE Anti-Human Trafficking Team),
- access to translation and interpretation services, (if necessary), access to counselling and information particularly regarding legal rights and access to legal aid and advice.

The Gardaí will conduct an interview with you to assess if you are a "suspected" victim of trafficking. They use the International Organization for Migration's identification procedures and other internationally used indicators as a guide. You will not have to leave Ireland during this process.

If you are identified by the Garda as a suspected victim of human trafficking under Irish law¹, the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service will grant you special permission to be in Ireland for a recovery and reflection period of sixty days, as long as you don't have any other immigration status here – for example, if you're not seeking asylum in Ireland, or if you're already entitled to be here as an EU citizen. The recovery and reflection period is to allow you time to recover and escape from the person who is alleged to have trafficked you, and to consider your options. You won't be asked to leave Ireland or deported during this time. If you are a child, the Minister for Justice can allow you to stay for longer than sixty days. The Minister will take into account who is taking care of you (your parent, guardian, or the Child and Family Agency) and what their status in Ireland is.

After the recovery and reflection period you may be granted renewable temporary residence permission for six months, as long as you have nothing more to do with the alleged traffickers, and if it is necessary to (and you choose to) help the Gardaí with an investigation or prosecution arising from the trafficking offence. This will only be renewed while you continue to co-operate with the Gardaí. During this time you'll be allowed to work in Ireland and claim certain social welfare benefits.

If you came to Ireland before 7th June 2008 and the alleged trafficking was before this, the law doesn't allow you to be granted a Temporary Residence Permit. In this case you can apply to the Irish Naturalisation & Immigration Service for what is called "leave to remain" and we can assist you with this.

If you have already applied for asylum, you can remain in Ireland as an asylum seeker until a final decision is made on your asylum application. If that decision is negative, you can apply for a temporary residence permission or leave to remain.

You can also take legal action against the people who are alleged to have trafficked you, or apply to the Criminal Injuries Compensation Tribunal for compensation.

You might be also able to claim compensation under employment law and we can advise you about this, although we won't be able to represent you in any proceedings you take.

If you don't wish to assist the Gardaí, and you don't have any other valid immigration status, you may be able to get help to return home from the IOM.

3. Legal Aid

The Legal Aid Board can provide you with provide free legal advice in relation to the following:

- your status in Ireland and the measures set out in the Administrative Immigration
 Arrangements which provide for recovery and reflection and temporary residence, as well
 as applications for leave to remain in the State,
- seeking redress through the employment protection legislation (legal advice only),
- information on what is involved in a criminal trial for a victim/witness.
- information on compensation,
- information on voluntary return home
- criminal matters related to the trafficking offence.

If you have or do apply for asylum, we can provide legal advice and legal representation in relation to your application, but you will have to pay €10 as a contribution towards legal services.

If you have been the victim of an alleged sexual offence, we can provide legal advice, and in certain circumstances legal representation if your prior sexual history will be brought up by the accused during the trial. You won't be charged for this service.

If you don't want to avail of free legal services from the Legal Aid Board, you can hire a private solicitor. However you will have to pay their fees and other costs.

4. What if I decide to co-operate with the Gardaí?

Trafficking in Human Beings is a crime. In Irish law it is an offence under the Criminal Law (Human Trafficking) Act 2008. Allegations of human trafficking are investigated, and prosecuted where appropriate If you decide to cooperate with the Gardaí's investigation, you will have to provide a statement of what happened and will be interviewed by members of the Gardaí, possibly a number of times.

If the person who is alleged to have trafficked you is charged and brought to trial, you will probably be asked to give evidence in court against them. We will provide you with legal advice throughout this process. Your temporary residence permit will be extended for as long as the investigation and prosecution continues. If you are an adult and you have been resident in Ireland under a temporary residence permission for three years, and have been assisting the authorities in relation to an investigation or prosecution arising in relation to the trafficking, you can apply to the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service for a change of status. You can do this earlier if the permission has been held for a continuous period and the investigation is complete.

5. Can I apply for asylum?

Yes. If you think you have grounds for asylum and have a fear of returning to your home country, you can apply to the Office of the Refugee Applications Commissioner to apply for asylum. You can apply to the law centre for legal services to assist you in this process. This is a separate process.

6. Can I get assistance to return to my home country?

The **International Organization for Migration** can help you return to your home country, provide safe accommodation, help you access a doctor and other medical person, develop your skills, provide training, and assist you in reintegrating into your home country.

7. Protection

A Crime Prevention Officer from the Gardaí is available to provide advice on personal safety and provide victims with a safety and security plan. The Gardaí also have a dedicated number **1800 25 00 25** and a 24/7 incident number **01 666 4964** to assist you with any security/protection concerns.

8. Compensation

You can take a civil case through the Irish courts for damages against the people who are alleged to have committed trafficking. If you were injured as a result of the actions of the traffickers you can seek damages from them through Injuriesboard.ie. If you decide to take a civil case and you need legal aid, you will need to apply separately to the law centre for legal services. Your means will be assessed and the Board will also examine the merits of your case before it can pay for a solicitor and barrister to represent you in Court.

If a person is convicted of having trafficked you, it is open for the Court to order them to compensate you. You can also apply to the Criminal Injuries Compensation Tribunal for compensation. The tribunal considers applications from people who suffer a personal injury or death as a result of a crime of violence. Compensation may be awarded on the basis of any vouched out of pocket expenses, including loss of earnings, that you have experienced. The incident in which the injury was caused must have been reported to the Gardaí Síochána without delay. You must apply to the tribunal within three months of the incident, though this can be extended if you can show that the reason for the delay in submitting the application justifies exceptional treatment of the application. A report from the Gardaí is required to progress the application for compensation.

9. I am an Irish citizen. Will I be provided with assistance?

Yes, you will be provided with assistance including:

- medical care and support through the HSE,
- legal aid and advice by the Legal Aid Board,
- safety and security advice by a Garda Crime Prevention Officer, and
- accommodation (if necessary) through the Community Welfare & Homeless Services.
